About DACC

Danville Area Community College is an accredited public two-year community college providing higher education opportunities for youth and adults in East Central Illinois. Established initially as an extension center of the University of Illinois in 1946, DACC became a public junior college under Danville Public Schools in 1949, and received the name Danville Junior College in 1951. In June 1966, the College became an independent two-year area college with its own Board of Trustees and junior college district. The name Danville Junior College was changed to Danville Area Community College in 1979, to be more reflective of the services rendered. District 507 encompasses high school districts in Vermilion, Edgar, Iroquois, Ford, and Champaign counties with an estimated population of 89,000.

In this annual report, we take a look at DACC's progress over the past year with regard to the four mission-critical pillars that inform the College's annual strategic plan which we call "The Matrix."

The fourth category is "Organizational Advancement," which offers an overview of the College's entrepreneurial ventures, our accomplishments in building community partnerships, and the past year's successes in local and regional workforce development.

In addition to these sections, you will also find information about the Danville Campus and the Hoopeston Learning Center as well as a report about DACC's extraordinarily successful Foundation, which has raised nearly a million dollars in the past year to support student scholarships and DACC operations.

This report concludes with a snapshot on DACC's financial performance during the 2017-18 fiscal year—with the College reaping the benefits of having contained costs while tapping into new revenue streams. Following that is a short chronology of DACC's 72-year history.

The pages immediately following this one are dedicated to DACC's Board of Trustees—seven volunteer community members and a DACC student, through whose vision and guidance DACC is able to fulfill its mission of service to residents throughout the 507 service district.

Elected to the DACC Board in 1999, Mr. Harby is a Country Financial representative in Danville. He has served as DACC's Board Chair since 2013. Mr. Harby graduated from DACC and Illinois State University. He was a Distinguished Alumnus at DACC. For the Illinois Community College Trustees' Association, he served as president from 2010 to 2011 and has won numerous awards from the ICCTA, including the Central Regional Trustee Leadership Award.

His prior experiences included election to the Vermilion County Board and to City of Danville government as an Alderman.

After a 30-year career as a teacher in Oakwood, he became athletic director at Danville High School, retiring in 2007.

A Catlin resident, Mrs. Hill is the Market President for Old National Bank. She is a DACC graduate and a Distinguished Alumna. Along with an associate in applied science at DACC, she earned a bachelor's degree in Business from Eastern Illinois University. Mrs. Hill's influence extends throughout the Danville community. She has been president of the Danville Library Foundation and the A.L Webster Foundation. She's currently on the ONB Foundation Board, the DACC Small Business Development Center Board, Vermilion Advantage Executive Board, and others.



Mr. John Spezia Term ends in 2023

Coach Spezia was elected to the DACC Board in 2011 after having served as the DACC men's basketball coach for 23 years and DACC's athletic director for 19 years. A two-time national coach of the year and athletic director of the year, he coached DACC to the 1991 NJCAA national championship. Coach Spezia won 400 games at DACC and a combined total of 530 games in schools and professionally. He was elected to the Hall of Fame for the National Junior College Athletic Association and for the Illinois Basketball Coaches' Association. He helped bring the NJCAA national men's basketball tournament to Danville in 1994, he assisted in ensuring that more than 200 of his athletes graduated to earn scholarships, and he launched summer camps for kids. He has coached overseas and still does consulting internationally.

Mr. Wolfe was elected to the Board in 2013 and is the liaison to the Illinois Community College Trustees' Association. A sales representative for Danville-based Trillium Staffing, Mr. Wolfe had served as president of the Oakwood Community Unit School District #76 from 2001-2013. 





Bonus Classes: Spring 2018

Number of Bonus Classes that DACC offered students during the Spring 2018 Semester. Bonus classes are offered free to students to help them graduate on time. Students registered for at least 12 credits are eligible to choose a Bonus Class to increase their semester credits to keep them on target for earning a 60-credit associate degree in two years.







In September 2017, TRIO celebrated 20 years of service and success for at-risk students. DACC's TRIO program has become a national model for achieving student success, last year having assisted 206 students—or nearly 9 percent more than the federal grant requires from a college of DACC's size. The "persistence rate" of 80 percent—which measures how students remain enrolled

from one academic year to the next—ranks DACC's TRIO near the top among the nation's 2,800 TRIO programs. The program requires only 50-percent persistence. Last year, more than 85 percent of the cohort achieved "good academic standing." The four-year graduation rate (30 percent) and the transfer rate (27 percent) are well ahead of the national standard.




This year, the College successfully launched self-service for Financial Aid through its online, management-information system, thereby giving students a tool for tracking and controlling the financial-aid process from the point of their initial FAFSA application right on through their award.

To prepare for the Higher Learning Commission's accreditation visit in March 2019, every month over the past two years the College's Expanded Administrative Council has dedicated parts of each meeting to studying accreditation criteria and presenting their individual department's "closing the loop" processes. Everybody takes turns leading the monthly discussion that features one or more of the core components within the five accreditation criteria. One of the group also presents his or her department's best example of how they adopted a continuous quality improvement system to address a problem they encountered in their work. Most of the time, the system encourages innovation and lends itself to a process in which data-based-decision-making and assessment form the framework for beneficial change.


In honor of national Small Business Week in May 2018, Director Carol Nichols hosted the annual Small Business Development Center's awards' banquet. Honorees included Baby Blessings 3D/4D Ultrasound, Myers Carpet Weavers, The Country Craftsmen & Chittick Family Eye Care. Ms. Nichols supports more than 50 local businesses annually. The Small Business Development Center has been with DACC since 1983.



Scientific Management Techniques President Steve Berry demonstrating the "Standard Timing Model," which DACC has begun using to provide mechanical-skills assessments to support local industry in hiring and training manufacturing workers. Funding for the program comes from a \$360,000 Industry Careers Pathway grant that DACC American Job Center Executive Director Brian Hensgen wrote. The College received an additional \$250,000 in June from the Workforce and Employer Readiness Consortium to support incumbent workers in local manufacturers like Watchfire Signs, thyssenkrupp, Viscofan, and Trigard as well as Vermilion County Works.



The DACC Foundation was awarded a \$20,000 grant from Arconic (formerly known as Alcoa) to support the Sustainability Farm. The funds will help purchase a beehive observation structure, various types of bee hives, a weather station, an agricultural drone, and a utility vehicle.



DACC partners with the K-12 vocational educational system, VVEDS, in a program called "College Express," which provides career and technical education on the DACC campus. This year, more than 450 high-school students participated in such College Express programs as automotive technology, wind technology, welding, computer programming, graphic design, culinary arts, robotics, mechanical training. Superintendent Nick Chatterton manages the program on behalf of eight regional school districts.

The number of District 507 high-school students who simultaneously earned both an associate degree from DACC and a high-school diploma, thanks to the College's dual-credit program offerings to more than 10 high schools in Vermilion County. The first regional student to earn a double degree was from Westville High in 2015. Along with this year's five college-and-high-school grads, at least 40 other local students earned more than 30 college credits upon graduating—which is equivalent to a full year of academic credits for most colleges and universities.

included Corporate Ed's Stephanie Yates, Nick Chatterton of College Express, Manufacturing Prof. Todd Flessner on Career and Technical Education, the American Job Center's Brian Hensgen and Jonathan Jett, Career Services' Carla Boyd, Adult Education's Laura Williams, the Foundation's Tracy Wahlfeldt, and Vermilion Advantage's Vicki Haugen.



Corporate Education under Director Stephanie Yates generated \$328,973 in customized business training last year in providing 7,000 training courses for locally employed workers. An example of the training is this Feb. 1, 2018, 40-hour training in Hazardous Waste Operations and Emergency Response Standard by OSHA. Participants included employees from Danville Public Works, DynaChem and Danville Metal Stamping.



DACC's annual Ag Day, which took place on Apr. 12, drew thousands of children of all ages to the sun-splashed campus for tractor races, the petting zoo, Horticulture tour, and the acclaimed 50-cents Farmers' Lunch. Introducing Jacobs Hall

On Aug. 31, 2017, the DACC Board of Trustees held a special outdoor meeting on the granite steps of the College's recently acquired Carnegie Library and approved the naming of the building in honor of DACC President Emerita Dr. Alice Marie Jacobs.

Philanthropist Julius W. Hegeler II pledged \$2 million toward renovating this century-old architectural marvel and suggested that the building be named after Dr. Jacobs, who served as DACC's president for more than 17 years.

The officially approved name for the building is "Dr. Alice Marie Jacobs Hall—a Carnegie Library" and it will become DACC's center for student learning and activities in the performing, visual, and musical arts.

The College received the building from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs in exchange for a gazebo located south of the Bremer Center. The newly christened Jacobs Hall stands in proximity to the Clock Tower building, which is where most of DACC's Liberal Arts classes and programs are held.

How the HLC Came to Be

The idea for the Hoopeston Learning Center surfaced in 2008 when DACC President Dr. Jacobs met with Hoopeston leaders who told her they were interested in a satellite DACC location. By 2009, DACC's Board of Trustees' pledged their support. The Carle Hoopeston Regional Health Center donated the 4,900-square-foot building to the College. From 2012-13, the College renovated in the facility. Work included the construction of five classrooms and a student commons.

Funding the new Center came from a variety of sources, including \$206,000 from the Hoopeston Area Healthcare Foundation and \$30,000 from the Hoopeston City Council.

Classes began in September 2013 at the renovated facility, which is located at 847 E. Orange St.

Bill Nicholls, a community leader in Hoopeston and a member of the DACC Foundation Board, broached the idea of the portrait this past spring. "Dr. Jacobs has done so much good for Hoopeston with the development of the center. Having her picture displayed inside is a fitting way to pay tribute to her contributions."





DACC History



DACC's Founding President Mary Miller

May 13, 1946: Mary Miller founds DACC as an extension center of the University of Illinois in 1946.

August 22, 1949: DACC becomes a public junior college under Danville Public Schools.

September 30, 1951: The College receives the name Danville Junior College.

Jan. 11, 1964: The Danville Area Community College Foundation is formed as a nonprofit 501 (c) 3 to support student scholarships.

August 1, 1965: The College acquires seven historic buildings from the Veterans Administration on East Main Street, moving to its current 75-acre campus.

September 12, 1965: The Danville Junior College Foundation launches a fundraising drive to support the move to the new campus.

April 11, 1966: DACC becomes an independent two-year area college with the election of its first Board of Trustees and the establishment of District 507.

May 17, 1969: Dedication of the Ornamental Horticulture Center.

April 30, 1970: Opening of the Mary Miller Center and Gymnasium.

July 1, 1972: Dr. William Langas becomes DACC's second president, replacing founding President Mary Miller after her 26-year tenure.

July 9, 1972: Completion of the Technology Center, which includes the South Bay, Weld Shop, Machine Shop, and offices.

June 15, 1979: Dr. Joseph Borgen becomes DACC's third president.

Sept. 1, 1979: The name Danville Junior College is changed to Danville Area Community College to be more reflective of the services rendered as a comprehensive community college.

Sept. 3, 1981: Dr. Ronald Lingle is announced as DACC's fourth president.

June 1, 1982: Renovation of the Bremer Theater and construction of conference rooms.

Sept. 10, 1982: Renovation of the Clock Tower building.

Feb. 14, 1987: Completion of the expansion of the Mary Miller Center's first and second floor

for Math and Science education.

July 1, 1989: Dr. Harry Braun is named DACC's fifth president.

Sept. 3, 1992: Expansion of the Technology Center and dedication in the name of former DACC President Harry Braun to open classrooms and offices on the north and west wings.

Mar. 16, 1994: DACC hosts the first of what will be 24 consecutive years (including this year) as host of the NJCAA Division II national men's basketball tournament.

Aug. 18, 1997: Dedication of the Child Development Center.

July 1, 1998: Remodeling of the Bremer Theater is completed.

Dec. 15, 1998: Job Training Partnership/Vermilion County Works moves to new location at 407 N. Franklin Street. Sept. 1, 1999: Dr. Alice Marie Jacobs becomes DACC's sixth president.

Nov. 1, 1999: Opening of Lincoln Hall.

May 17, 2000: Remodeling completed for the first floor and basement of the Clock Tower Library.

Apr. 1, 2001: Remodeling of the art and painting rooms in the Clock Tower building.

Oct. 24, 2002: Completion of \$30 million in renovations to Cannon, Prairie, and Vermilion halls.

Sept. 30, 2004: Dedication of the First National Bank Collection of Public Art in the Clock Tower Center.

Sept. 10, 2005: Community Education begins holding classes in a store at the Village Mall.

Nov. 7, 2007: Dedication of the Bremer Conference and Workforce Development Center.

July 31, 2009: Demolition work completed on buildings 5, 9 and 10 as well as underground tunnels.

Oct. 10, 2009: Julius W. Hegeler II Garden Gateway is dedicated.

Mar. 29, 2011: Opening of the Julius W. Hegeler II Greenhouse.

July 11, 2011: Construction of the Wind Turbine Training Tower, which is located on farm ground.

Oct. 24, 2012: Completion of Mary Miller Complex expansion and renovation and the naming of the William B. Black Health Professions Center.

July 15, 2013: DACC is named an Achieving the Dream Leader College.

Sept. 16, 2013: Opening of the Hoopeston Higher Learning Center: first day of classes.

Dec. 10, 2014: Dedication ceremony to open the Julius W. Hegeler II Advanced Technology Center.

Aug. 15, 2016: Dr. Stephen Nacco becomes DACC's seventh president, replacing Dr. Alice Marie Jacobs, who retires on Aug. 30 after 17 years as DACC's president.

Nov. 1, 2016: DACC dedicates the Bobette Steely Hegeler Memorial Bench in front of the Clock Tower.

July 1, 2017: DACC becomes one of the nation's few community colleges to become a regional one-stop operator for a federally mandated American Job Center.

Aug. 31, 2017: After receiving an official notice of transferring the former Carnegie Library from the Veterans Administration to DACC, the Board of Trustees holds a ceremony to dedicate the building in the name of Dr. Alice Marie Jacobs. A \$2 million bequest from philanthropist Julius W. Hegeler II will fund the renovation of Jacobs Hall.



This Carnegie Library has been officially dedicated as Dr. Alice Marie Jacobs Hall, which will be home to DACC students' performing arts, musical arts, visual arts, and dramatic arts.


